- **Dr. Sonia Cancian** is completing a manuscript on love letters written in the historical context of Italian post-war migration to Canada. Her research interests lie in Italian migration history to Canada and correspondence, family dynamics, gender roles and the history of emotions. She has begun a new research project at the Max Planck Institute for Human Development on war memories and migration for which she has applied for funding with the European Research Council.
- **Dr. Deepra Dandekar** is currently engaged in a research project on migration narratives at the Max Planck Institute for Human Development. She has published on various themes associated with gender, religion, conversion and the emotions of belonging. Her book on religious conversion in nineteenth-century India has recently been published by Oxford University Press.
- **Dr. Soňa Mikulová** is advancing on a research project at Max Planck Institute for Human Development on the creation of emotional communities of German Expellees in West Germany after 1945, focusing especially on their integration into church communities. Her research interests lie in German history, German-Italian and German-Czech relations, memory studies and the history of emotions.
